Walk for Animals on May 19th

Please join us on Sunday, May 18th from 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. at Nomahegan Park in Cranford (across from Union College) as we WALK FOR ANIMALS. All proceeds will be used exclusively to support our Pet Rescue and Adoption Program that provides medical care, food and shelter for homeless pets awaiting adoption such as Bobby.

Participants may start the Walk any time between 10 a.m. and 1 p.m. The Walk is approximately two miles in length. Refreshments will be served. You may attend with or without a dog. Each dog that attends will receive a Doggie Bag filled with goodies.

Contests for the dogs will be held at 11 a.m. and at 1 p.m. The contest categories are: best trick, loudest bark, best kisser, fastest tail wagger, highest jumper, shortest dog and tallest dog. Dogs may enter any or all of the contests but may win only one contest. To participate in a contest, a dog must be registered for the Walk.

PETSMART will again be our corporate sponsor. The PETSMART stores at the Watchung Square Mall and at the Bridgewater Promenade Mall are the hosts for most of our adoption events. Puppies Fighting for Life... We Need Your Help

People for Animals recently rescued Bobby and his five sibling five-week old puppies from a local shelter. All of the littermates appeared playful and healthy. Unfortunately, within days of the rescue, all of the pups came down with parvo, an extremely contagious disease to which puppies are vulnerable due to their immature immune system.



As we go to press, five of the six babies are engaged in the fight of their short lives under 24-hour care at a specialized veterinary hospital. Sadly, one little girl has died and the remaining five are still struggling to survive. Their condition is guarded but improving. As you may know, People for Animals is a 'no-kill' organization. Once we take responsibility for an animal, we will do whatever is necessary to save its life.

The expense for the treatment of parvo is high. It includes the hospitalization, repeated tests, IVs, fluids, massive amounts of antibiotics and round-the-clock care by hospital staff. Please help People for Animals defray the costs of saving these precious puppies by sending a donation in the enclosed envelope.

Join the "Dog Days Club"

People For Animals works to help homeless dogs and cats find new, forever homes. Once an animal joins our organization it has a safe place to stay until it can be rehomed. Because PFA has no shelter facility, our dogs must stay in private kennels. Most of the cats reside in foster homes. The cost of kenneling a dog is approximately \$15 per day. Several of our dogs are difficult placements and have been living in the kennels or foster homes for extended periods of time. The funding it take to kennel these dogs limits PFA's ability to help other needy dogs.

The Dog Days Club allow you, the public, to sponsor one (or more) of our long-term residents. You may choose to sponsor one day per month for a donation of \$15 and are certainly welcome you to sponsor more than one day. Once you join the program you will be sent a picture of your dog and his or her history. As the program progresses, you will receive periodic updates on your dog.

We don't want to forget our feline friends in foster care. While they do not have the overhead costs of kenneling, many of our long-term cats have special medical or behavioral issues that add to the normal feeding and general care expenses. If you would prefer to help out with sponsoring a cat, a \$10 per month donation will allow you to join the Club. As with dog sponsors, you will receive a photo of your pet, its history and periodic updates.

The following is a list of our long timers. You may select a specific animal or one will be assigned to you.



Kailee is a very sweet dog who is eagerly waiting for a family of her own. Kailee does not get along with cats or other dogs so she must be the only pet in the household. Kailee would do best in a home without children as she does not like strangers and might not be friendly to visiting playmates. She tends to get protective of her family. Kailee loves to play ball and go for walks.



Zeus is a serious, intelligent three-year-old Mountain Dog mix. He has been obedience trained, but still requires an experienced handler and an all adult home. Zeus is protective yet very loving towards the people he knows.



Jessie was adopted over a year ago, after having spent a long time waiting for the right person. Unfortunately, he was returned to us recently because the couple had a baby, and the baby was allergic to Jessie. He does not get along with other dogs or cats, and so we expect he may wait a long time for the right people.



Sadie is pretty and sweet! She's smart, and eager to learn. She likes people a lot, and is always ready for some attention. However, she's not crazy about sharing the attention, and wouldn't want any other cats or dogs around to steal it. She has a high energy level, and would love to get lots of exercise! She knows how to sit, and how to give paw!



Ellie has been with us for just under a year. She is very frightened of people, but she loves other dogs and she loves to run around to play. She is on expensive medication to try to relieve her anxiety so that we can socialize her.

The white van with the words "Neuter Scooter" emblazoned on the sides was a welcome site for the cluster of officers gathered at the Mid-State Correctional Facility in Wrightstown. The Neuter Scooter was on a mission to pick up 17 cats for a trip to the People for Animals Clinic for spay/neuter. PETSMART Charities donated the Neuter Scooter to PFA for transporting cats to and from our Low Cost Spay/Neuter Clinic. Of the 17 cats that were transported, 10 were released back to the Mid-State colony and 7 were adoptable and placed in homes. The cats have shelter in sheds and small doghouses on the facility property. They are fed and looked after by Mid-State personnel.

Bill A1586 bans the surgical silencing of dogs. The law prohibits canine debarking except where veterinarians are protecting the health or life of the animal.

10. Spay/Neuter Now Before Your Pet is a Statistic

Did you know that in 1999, 114,590 animals were impounded in New Jersey animal shelters. Of those, 47,903 were euthanized. Encourage anyone and everyone you know, to spay and neuter their pets. Spay/neuter is the only humane way to reduce these tragic numbers.

11. Clinic Hours & Fees

Preoperative exams are given on a first come first served basis every Tuesday from 5 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. and Saturday from 9 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. Fees are \$35 for male cats, \$40 for female cats, \$35 to \$55 for dogs depending on sex and weight. Fees include the pre-op exam, rabies and distemper shots, plus the spay/neuter surgery by our experienced licensed veterinarians. Note: pregnant cats and dogs can be spayed.



Our Low Cost Spay/Neuter Clinic Needs Your Help

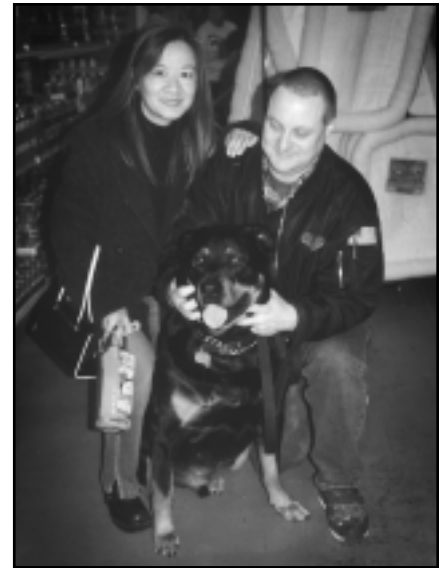


All Rescued Dogs Welcome to Enter Stray Pet Contest

No, Not Again... It's Kitten Season

The overpopulation of cats in New Jersey appears to be never-ending. Are you part of the problem or part of the solution? If you are feeding outside cats, get them spayed/neutered as soon as possible. Do you realize that by keeping them well feed they are healthy to breed? Cats can have two litters a year. In one year a female cat can have an average of 8 kittens and if the kittens are female they can have kittens by the time they are 6 months of age. Call your local animal control to inquire about borrowing a humane trap if you cannot handle the cats. Our Clinic charges only \$35 to neuter a male cat and \$40 to spay a female cat, including pregnant cats. You can also call SPAYUSA for financial assistance if you are caring for outside cats.
